Cover Feature The Organ at St. John the Beloved Church Summerville, South Carolina

Upon returning to South Carolina following eight years as associate organist at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, Alan Davis accepted the challenge of building a new music program and guiding the design and funding of a new organ in this growing parish. This instrument exemplifies how a finely designed memorial donation program can serve to galvanize the parish.

"From the choice of builder, to the choice of stop specification and tonal concept, this instrument's primary purpose was the accompanying of both choir and congregation for the liturgy. The organ is enclosed in a freestanding oak casework speaking directly across the nave of the church. The choir risers front the lower panels of the case forming a complete area for the music ministry. The case contains polished pipework of the Pédale and the Grand-Orgue Montre with Romanesque mouths. The rounded towers include handcarved pear-leaf pipe shades finished in gold. The crowning solo reed, the Beloved Trompette, features Willis-type shallots. As with many of our instruments, the low-profile French-style tiered keydesk works effectively in worship, ideally serving to reduce the overall height of the console and maintain eye contact with the choir and celebrating ministers.

The instrument was dedicated by the Most Rev. David B. Thompson, Bishop of Charleston, followed by a dedicatory recital played by the Right Rev. Francis Kline, Abbott of Our Lady of Mepkin Abbey.

anisms and pipework of the great Kilgen organs at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City. In 1997, a new Nave division with a complete principal and reed chorus replaced the old Echo division located in the triforium midpoint of the nave. This division served tonally to connect the Gallery organ on Fifth Avenue and the Chancel organ on Madison Avenue. In that division, a new hooded Willis Tuba was installed on 18 inches of pressure in the triforium arches as a foil to the big chamade on the Gallery instrument. The Peragallos continue as curators of the organs to this day.

Another notable project was the 2001 refurbishment of the Moller at the Paulist Church of St. Paul the Apostle in New York City. In addition to complete mechanical restoration and digital updating of the switching, a new four-manual terraced console was installed. The organ was rededicated in a concert that included organists John Weaver, Kent Tritle, Dorothy Pa-

padakos, and Steven Tharp.

Opus 596 built for St. Theresa Church in Trumbull, Conn., is a III/38 instrument designed by parish musicians John Michniewicz and his wife, Carolina Flores, in consultation with John Peragallo III. The ideal placement of the organ casework behind the baldacchino on the central axis of the church projects the tonal resources evenly and effectively throughout the nave. The casework is finished red oak with hand-carved pipe shades inspired by elements of the filial crown of the baldacchino. The organ was featured in a recording by Stephen Tharp on the Ethereal label.

More recent projects of note include Opus 643, St. Peter Church, Columbia, S.C., and Opus 647, St. Stephen Episcopal Church in Port Washington, N.Y., which was dedicated by Edward Tipton, organist of the American Cathedral in Paris. St. Teresa's Church in Staten Island, Opus 620, is home to an ambitious program of concerts under the auspices of the pastor, the Rev. John O'Hara and has featured artists Felix Hell, Olivier Latry, Cameron Carpenter, and Frederick Swann. Opus 641 at the Community Church in Holmdel, N.J., was designed and dedicated by Cj Sambach. Peragallo has also been honored to have Joyce Jones dedicate the instrument at St. Teresa of Avila Church in Summit, N.J.

Upcoming installations include Opus 652 (III/23) in the John Whitney residence in Atlanta, Ga.,—an exciting design along French lines featuring a freestanding African mahogany casework with carved figurines. Other projects of note include St. Augustine Cathedral in the Bridgeport Diocese, Conn. (III/48), St. Nicholas of Tolentine in Atlantic City, N.J. (III/49), Trinity Presbyterian Church in East Brunswick, N.J. (II/18), and St. John Church in Westminster, Md.

(III/33).


